#### **Environmental & Social (E&S) Portfolio Screening Questionnaire**

Thank you for choosing the Foundation Development and Climate Alliance ("Foundation") as your partner. Our Foundation, as a publicly funded institution, is committed to upholding and respecting Environmental and Social (E&S) requirements and human rights in all of our activities and we are strongly convinced that every sector has an active role to play in the positive interaction between economic, social and ecological development to balance the interests of this and future generations. Furthermore, we consider sustainable development as one of the key factors for a successful long-term business operation. Therefore, we only advise and promote Offset Partners and projects that share our convictions and can provide evidence that their processes, products and services manage E&S risks associated with their activities or that they are prepared to implement necessary measures to do so in the future.

This E&S Portfolio Screening Questionnaire has been designed as an easy and quick checklist for our potential Offset Partners to provide initial information to the Foundation in order for us to understand the scale and significance of the E&S know-how and procedures applied at the Foundation to evaluate the E&S impacts and risks of its engagement. In the unlikely event that significant issues are identified, it may be necessary to follow up with a closer investigation of these specific E&S aspects by external experts. All information will of course be treated confidentially.

The Foundation's review of your answers to this E&S Portfolio Screening Questionnaire will be based on widely used and internationally recognized requirements laid out in (1) the Kreditanstalt für Wiederaufbau (KfW) Exclusion List<sup>1</sup> and Sustainability Guidelines<sup>2</sup>, (2) the International Finance Corporation (IFC) Performance Standards<sup>3</sup> and (3) the Core Labour Standards of the International Labour Organization (ILO)<sup>4</sup>.

**Part I of** the Questionnaire is to be completed by the potential Offset Partners during the application phase and subsequently reviewed by the Foundation's E&S Expert.

Part II will be filled out by the Foundation's E&S Experts only.

- Please note that the term "environment" and "social" include environmental and health & safety issues, as
  well as labour conditions and impacts on local communities or other relevant stakeholders, on social and
  cultural infrastructure, and on cultural heritage.
- Please attempt to answer all questions and attach additional information where appropriate. If certain questions are not relevant to your business, please write "not applicable"; if information is not available, please write "no information".
- Please provide all information in English language.
